Getting there

This trail can be reached by bus from Chichester or Midhurst. There is a good south coast train service to Chichester which can be linked to the regular no. 60 Stagecoach bus service (half hourly throughout the day Mondays to Saturdays, hourly in the evening and on Sundays and Bank Holidays – see timetable below). The relevant bus stops are Cocking Hill and West Dean Gardens for the start and finish of the Trail respectively. There is parking in West Dean Gardens car park. The timings given below are minutes past the hour:




- Sturdy footwear is recommended

- Do not stray onto private property



Working in Partnership to Protect the South Downs

Who is Andy Goldsworthy?

Andy Goldsworthy is an internationally famous British artist who creates sculptures made from natural materials. As an environmental artist, Andy works with the

materials to hand in the chosen locations for his sculptures.

In this case he has chosen to work with the chalk from the South Downs, a material which originates from the skeletal remains of marine creatures deposited between 70 and 100 million years ago in the warm sea which covered most of Southern England at that time.

"Chalk is a huge mass of material in the Downs and yet is largely hidden. Where it does make an appearanceit looks strange and unreal, as if it didn't belong."



What are the Chalk Stones?

They are one of a number of art projects in West Sussex for 2002 which have been developed by Strange Partners (see back of leaflet). Following on from his Midsummer Snowballs project in London for the Millennium, Andy Goldsworthy has made a series of chalk stones (approximately 6-7ft in diameter) with chalk taken from a local downland quarry, and placed them in chosen locations along a self-guided trail on the South Downs.

The sculpted chalk stones set in the heart of the countryside present questions about the role of built artefacts in what may seem like a natural environment, but is in fact a highly managed product.

Walk the trail and find the Chalk Stones



At the next junction, follow the fenceline curving to your right. When the track splits again, take the left fork, leaving the fenceline behind. You are immediately faced with a further three tracks, take the middle one straight ahead. At the crossroads with a wide dirt/stone track cross the track and follow the bw down the hill. Continue along the track and then up a steep incline. At the next three junctions continue round to your right, following the blue bw signs. At the top of the incline, on your right, hidden in the woodland behind the yew tree, is the remains of an old, isolated smallholding, which fell into disuse about fifty years ago. The surrounding woodland "Newfarm Plantation" is named after this farm.

You will come to a wide junction of four tracks, take the bw immediately to your left and continue along a wide track with tall fir trees on either side. Look out for the remains of an bronze age barrow to your right. Over the centuries human activity has shaped the landscape as we know it today. Some of the earliest settlements were on the chalk downland which has many important archaeological sites. From this point on, the Trail is runs through land owned by the West Dean Estate, part of the Edward James Foundation. Woodland either side of the trail at this point is managed in a sustainable way with larch and beech replanted after the 1987 storm. Thinnings from the Estate woodland provide the fuel to heat West Dean College.

- 4. Continue straight on at the next bw junction and down a wide, grassy/stone track until you get to West Dean Woods Nature Reserve. The bw then leaves the woodland and passes through an avenue of trees with views across open farmland to your right. West Dean Woods are managed by the Sussex Wildlife Trust, with the hazel coppice being cut every eight years.
- 5. At the lane, go through the bw gate and turn left. Follow the lane for a short distance and take the next footpath to your right. Go up the hill, over the stile at the top, and down to meet the lane again on the other side. Turn right and continue along the lane. The trees planted on either side of the long, straight avenue were planted at the request of Edward James in order to provide continuous woodland cover from his home, Monkton House, to West Dean.
- 6. After passing the cottage, turn left at the footpath sign and follow the chalky track up and over the hill. Partway down the other side of the hill the path forks, take the left fork straight ahead along a grassy track. Cross over the stile and continue down to the railway arch and the A286. This ornate brick and flint arch is part of the remains of the old Chichester to Midhurst railway. It is known locally as the King's Bridge, as King Edward VII, who was a frequent visitor to West Dean used to like walking this path out into the South Downs.
- 7. Turn left and continue along the pavement to the bus stop. Buses stopping at this point will take you back to the starting point of the trail at Cocking Hill, or on to Midhurst. If returning by bus in the Chichester direction, cross the road to the other bus stop. While you are waiting for the bus, you may wish to visit West Dean Gardens (entrance fee payable), where there is a further Chalk Stone sculpture in the park, or their shop/restaurant, both are open 1st March to 31st October (for further details tel. 01243 818210). If so, cross the road, go through the gate marked "West Dean Gardens", and follow the signs.
